Oregon Coast Railroad Announces New Station

Hoyt Street Passengers No Longer Wait On Tracks

Mathew A. Thompson, President of the Oregon Coast Railroad, announced today with Great Acclaim the opening of a new passenger station serving Hoyt Street.
